From Your President

It seems that 2019 is flying by! With the advent of spring just around the corner, W-PHS finds itself immersed in many efforts which further support our mission. The Board of Trustees and other volunteers are engaged in a variety of activities that promise to build awareness, generate additional interest and engage others in the work of the society.



Our membership campaign is well underway. We extend a warm welcome to our new members who have recently joined and gratefully acknowledge those who have renewed their memberships. We encourage all who may not have had an opportunity to renew to please do so at your earliest convenience. The society is member driven, and we rely on memberships to fund the work we do, whether preserving photos, documents, artifacts, and oral histories; or producing exhibits, programs, and printed materials; or holding annual events such as Homecoming, Garage Sale or the Moonlight Cemetery Tour and other special events. In addition, memberships and other contributions help to maintain and improve the properties owned by the society which include the W-PHS home, Gates Hall and Centennial Park.

Plans for our 62nd Annual Homecoming Celebration are well underway for July 19, 20 and 21. Last year, we made several meaningful changes that were well received, and we are continuing on with the same format this year. Letters and applications have gone out to vendors and antique dealers for the Open Air Marketplace, and the solicitation of quilts has begun for our 2nd Annual Quilt Show.

Standing Committees are hard at work to ensure effectiveness of our exhibits, programs, collections, grants, communications and fundraising efforts, as well as, property maintenance and improvements. As mentioned in a previous newsletter, later in the year we will be launching fundraising efforts to support remediation at Gates Hall in order to preserve it for future generations. In addition, volunteers are working on special projects and on a collaboration with the Williamson Central School District, which supports our education and outreach initiatives.

On behalf of the society, I acknowledge Pultneyville resident and neighbor Bette Jenkins for her efforts to research and communicate a NYS Historic Homeowners Tax Credit Program available to those owning properties in the Pultneyville Historic District whose homes are on the National Register of Historic Places. Bette brought this information to the attention of the W-PHS Board and personally shared her research about the process with owners of the 23 remaining Pultneyville properties, which at one time numbered 36, in our historic district. Bette was also a guest speaker on this topic at a recent meeting of the Wayne Historian's Organization, comprised of representatives from every town in the county. Her willingness to share and guide others through this process offers encouragement to those eligible for this program, which supports efforts to remain good stewards of historic properties. To be eligible for the current program, which expires in 2024, the residence must be on a historic registry and be in a census tract which is at, or below, the NYS family median income level, which is true of Pultneyville. Renovations must total at least \$5,000, and at least 5% of those allowed expenses must be on the exterior. I share this information in hopes that it

may benefit our members living in Pultneyville or in a historic district in other parts of NYS; and lastly, because perhaps it's time to consider expanding our current historic district that was established in 1985 through the efforts of W-PHS. **From a 1960 newspaper column titled:
“Williamson ...Approximately
80 Years Ago”**

The following is from a letter written by Adelaide S. Lawrence in January of 1960 to Leslie L. Blake. Mr. Blake had written a letter to *The Williamson Sun* recalling memories of the preceding forty years. After reading the recollections, Mrs. Lawrence of Pultneyville wrote to Mr. Blake with what she remembered. Her letter, as written, follows:

Dear Mr. Blake:

I was much interested in your article in the *Williamson Sun* of January 21, 1960, as it recalled many memories of the preceding (sic) forty years.

My childhood was spent in a house located on the site of the Central Trust Company. Richard Cheetham bought the house, built and operated a private bank for many years. The building next west, now cement covered, was a field of stone occupied by John Stark as a residence and shoe shop. On the second floor was a hall where various entertainments were held.

The Presbyterian Church was what is now the Sunday School rooms. Next was the cobblestone home of Myron Bennett, now a gas station. There were no houses beyond until the farm home of Erastus Seely, next but one to the green house.

On the opposite side where Mrs. Pearsall resides, was the farm home of James Harden and a saw mill owned by Frank Rogers was near the residence of Judge Brasser. No houses then until the Decker home, then owned by a Mr. Patrick. Next the home and office of Dr. L.S. Sprague. Lawyer John Tinklepaugh lived in the Charles Brower house. Eugene Parkhill lived in about where the Valore Insurance Agency stands, and in the basement was a meat market where one could purchase delicious tenderloin steaks for twelve and a half cents per pound. Then came the general store of C. I. DeZutter, next a small novelty one, run by his brother Leonard, who made fine willow ware. Next was Ouderkirk's Hotel, the grandfather of John Olmstead.

The house on South Avenue owned by Dr. Herbert, was the farm of Seely Poppino and Prospect Street, first called Poppino, was a part of his farm. A grist mill owned by Thomas Seely and William Eaton was

on the site of the International Harvester Building, and back of it was a sulphur well and people came from miles around to carry some of the wonderful, health giving, vile smelling liquid, which was fortunately not intoxicating. Mr. Easton lived next door and beyond him, E. R. Cooper, photographer. The small building north of Leenhouts' store was the Post Office, and Mames and Sweeting was the general store where Leenhouts' now operates. On the site of Williamson Hardware was a cobblestone building known as Pound's store. The American Legion Home was the office and residence of Dr. A. G. Austin, who in addition to looking after the health and welfare of the community, also kept fine horses and peacocks. There were no houses beyond this until R.R.

Just west of the M.E. Church lived Lewis French and next was his blacksmith shop, an interesting place for children, even little girls, to watch the sparks fly.

Beyond the eastern limit of the village, now the house of Attorney Barrett was the farm home of Noah Elton, and Elton's Pond was the skating rink.

At the corner of East Main and Locust Street across from the cemetery stood the "old school," a one story, one room frame building. About 1875, Maple Avenue was opened and at the far end the "new school" was built. It was a square two-story, red brick building. On the first floor were two rooms where the primary and intermediate grades were taught. The "high school" at least it was reached by a flight of winding steps, was one large room with a stage at one side, on the second floor.

On the outside front was a white marble inset bearing in large black figures, the date, 1876.

The building has long since been replaced by the present splendid building where the children are taught many things undreamed of in those early days. May the next two forty-year periods bring to Williamson as much improvement as the past ones.

The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the *Auchampaugh* home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years.

Rooms in the home contain exhibits, archived information, a gift shop and business office. The Society House is regularly open the third weekend in June through the first weekend in October, Friday through Sunday, 1-4 p.m., by appointment and throughout Homecoming weekend and during the Annual Community Garage Sale.

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


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
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
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
