Wayne County celebrated its 200th birthday with a very moving Founders Day Celebration on April 11th in Lyons on the Court House steps followed by a luncheon, exhibits and a program at the Lyons Community Center. It was a day-long event filled with welcoming remarks by Philip W. Eygnor, Chairman of the Wayne County Board of Supervisor and recognitions by local, regional and statewide dignitaries and officials offering words of congratulations and proclamations.

Beginning with “Ode to Joy” by the North Rose Handbell Choir under the direction of Lucinda Collier, and the tolling of bells countywide by area churches, fire halls, schools, and town halls, the air was filled with a joyful noise and jubilant sounds marking the significance of a milestone celebration and special moment in our shared history. Among the special moments of the day was a tribute to the late Peter Evans, former Wayne County Historian, by son and daughter Ben K. Evans and Emily Evans Terry. As most of you know, Peter was a Pultneyville resident along with Sue Jane and an active community member since 1979, a long time W-PHS member and renowned lifetime advocate of local history. While Peter’s presence will be missed, his dedication to the preservation of our history, along with his passion for all things

having to do with local history, and the belief that it is relevant and important to every community, will continue to be respected and treasured.

W-PHS Receives NYSCA Capital Projects Grant

W-PHS is excited to announce that we have been awarded Capital Projects funding for Fiscal Year 2023 by the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA). The \$50,000 award will be used to install a new HVAC system (furnaces & air-conditioning units) in Gates Hall.

The Hall's outdated and failing boiler will be replaced with an energy-efficient HVAC system servicing the entire building. This project will reduce heating costs and install air conditioning in the Hall for the first time, mitigating the negative effects of interior climate fluctuations and improving the indoor air quality. The new HVAC system will also allow us to attract a wider variety of performance groups and audiences to the hall—making temperatures more comfortable in both the summer and winter—and continue to grow the cultural development in our area.

The grants writing team of Patricia Cory-Doniger, Laura Wayland-Smith Hatch, and Nanette Hance worked together for several months—first setting up the required New York State grants accounts and then working on providing the project details and the history and usage of Gates Hall required by NYSCA. Patricia, an experienced grants writer, guided the team through the process, and we owe her many thanks for help with this project.

W-PHS is most appreciative for the support of Governor Kathy Hochul and NYSCA which enables the continued improvement and preservation of historic Gates Hall which will celebrate its 200th Birthday in 2025. Of the \$42M awarded throughout New York State for Arts and Culture Projects, this grant is one of three awarded in the Finger Lakes Region and the only one in Wayne County.

First steps are underway. We'll be meeting with the contractor soon and gathering the next stage of paperwork required by NYSCA. With that in place, the real work will begin, and we'll be sharing all the progress with you.

Setting the Scene for “At Samuel’s Tavern, And Thereabouts” Play Coming to Gates Hall Stage May 6 & 7

From the desk of Nanette Peters Hance as published in the Finger Lakes Times on April 15, 2023 as part of the Wayne County NY Bicentennial 2023 “Looking Back” column series.

Early settlers were beginning to permanently settle in the hamlet of Pultneyville already in 1806, just four short years after Williamson became a town in 1802, and well before the founding of Wayne County in 1823. Among Pultneyville’s earliest settlers were Captain Samuel Throop and his wife, Ruth Selby and two young children. Together, they traveled a dirt pathway through uncleared forests that led northward from Williamson’s four corners to the southern shore of Lake Ontario. Ending in what is now Pultneyville, a hamlet in the Town of Williamson, this was the place the Throop family, and many other early settlers, would call home.

One of seven children, Samuel was born to Benjamin and Rachael Brown Throop in 1779 in Lebanon, New London, CT, who were among the first settlers of Palmyra. Samuel Throop married Ruth Selby in 1797 in Middlebury, Vermont. According to the US New England Seaman’s Protection Certificate Index, 1796-1871, Samuel received his United States New England declaration on October 12, 1799. He was an experienced salt-water sailor and became a well-known Lake Captain, as documented on the Memorial Monument to the early Lake Captains of Pultneyville. Erected in 1935, this monument overlooks Lake Ontario where Mill and Washington Streets meet in a small park at lake’s edge welcoming visitors, from both near and far, along with history-filled Seaway Trail interpretive panels.

Samuel came to the area in 1805 that, at the time, was still part of Ontario County. He came to build a dam for a land company and settled in Pultneyville in 1806 when he and Ruth built a crude log cabin in which they lived until their frame home was finished in 1807. It was the first frame house built on land in the village where Samuel had proudly purchased three lots. It was in this house that the first tavern in the hamlet also resided until 1816.

Hard work, hard times and periods of difficulty, pangs of heartache and loss were certainly not strangers to the Throop family. After the hardships and challenges experienced with traveling and settling an undeveloped area like Pultneyville, they had also suffered devastating personal loss. Losing their first two children . . . Horatio, at just three years of age and infant, Julia Ann, both whom drowned in a tragic boating accident on Lake Ontario when visiting Pultneyville before settling there was heartbreaking. Sadly, it was another “first” for this family as their daughter, Julia Ann, was said to be the first person buried in Pultneyville.

Later on in 1807, Samuel and Ruth welcomed another son, Horatio Nelson Throop who was the first European American male child born in Pultneyville. Following in his father’s footsteps, Captain H. N. Throop carried on family traditions with his love of the water and as shipbuilder and captain of both schooners and steamships. Horatio also became widely known for his experiments with wind driven machinery and screw propellers in the 1830s. Many of his prototypes can be seen on exhibit at the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society house. Also on display are half hull models of his ships and the cabin doors that saved his life when his ship, Sophia, sunk in 1827.

Setting the Scene...continued.

A family of “firsts” in the village, the Throops are remembered for building the “first” frame house in Pultneyville; for having the “first” public house and tavern in which their family also lived; for their daughter being the “first” to be buried in the village; for giving birth to the “first” European American male child in the village and last, but not least, Samuel himself, sailed the “first” vessel, Farmer, owned in Pultneyville in 1810 as documented on the Lake Captain’s monument.

Samuel Throop lost his well-lived life in 1819, at just forty years old. He drowned while attempting to enter Sodus Bay in a gale and was later laid to rest in Pultneyville’s Lakeview Cemetery. He saw and accomplished a lot in his short life and is credited with being instrumental in settling the area in accordance with a plan laid out by J. W. Hallett, land agent of the Pultney Estate.

Together, as we continue to commemorate the Wayne County Bicentennial throughout 2023, there are many opportunities that take us back in time and celebrate our history. One such opportunity to look back is through an original play to be presented in

May by the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society (W-PHS). Motivated by three of Samuel Throop’s tavern journals which reside in the W-PHS archives, “*At Samuel’s Tavern, And Thereabouts*” reveals satisfactions, frustrations and merriment of the pioneering Throop family, along with a colorful cast of characters who portray other early settlers who also forged their unique paths through the wilderness to Pultneyville.

Written by W-PHS playwright, Irene Bierer, the play will be presented on Saturday, May 6th and Sunday, May 7th at historic Gates Hall, 4107 Lake Road in Pultneyville. Pultneyville Recollections

W-PHS is pleased to present Part 1 in a series of three articles as written by Mr. Philip (Pete) Rupert who summered in Pultneyville from childhood through adulthood, and was a visitor on many special family occasions. Mr. Rupert has fond recollections of his time in Pultneyville and of the people he spent time with.

While today, Mr. Rupert is a resident of Rochester, Pultneyville holds a special place in his heart as recalled in this three-part series. Enjoy!

Part One: The Graeper Sisters

My four aunts and their connection to the historic Captain Throop House in Pultneyville began in 1927 when they rented the house for a short visit in the summer of 1927. Subsequently, they purchased the property in 1929. This was just six months prior to the 1929 Great Depression, surely a difficult time for the sisters to make an investment in an historic property. But these were special women -- all with college degrees and employed in professions that allowed them to pitch in and gain ownership together. They envisioned the home and special community as the perfect place for their summer residence.

Known as the Graeper Sisters -- Emma, Carolyn, Martha and Olga were children of Reverend Henry and Caroline Graeper, along with my mother Otilie (Teal) an additional two sisters and two brothers.

Aunt Emma, graduated from Syracuse University was second born and the leader of the sisterhood. She had taught at Mechanics Institute, a precursor of RIT. She had a long-held vision of ownership in a Tea Room which she added to the Throop House, called "The Woodshed." The date of that construction is not known.

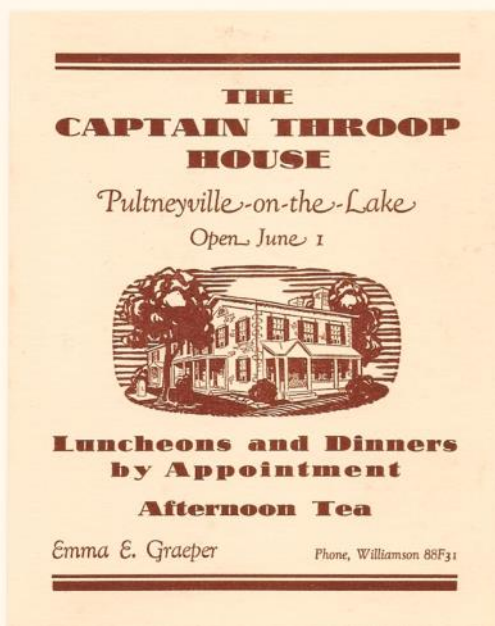

Aunt Martha earned a master's degree at Columbia University and went on to become a college professor teaching future kindergarten teachers at Potsdam Teachers College (now SUNY Potsdam) in the north country. She believed in the necessity of play time for young children, and her advocacy led to the adoption of the concept by New York State and incorporated into the curriculum. Martha was way ahead of the times in the field of education.

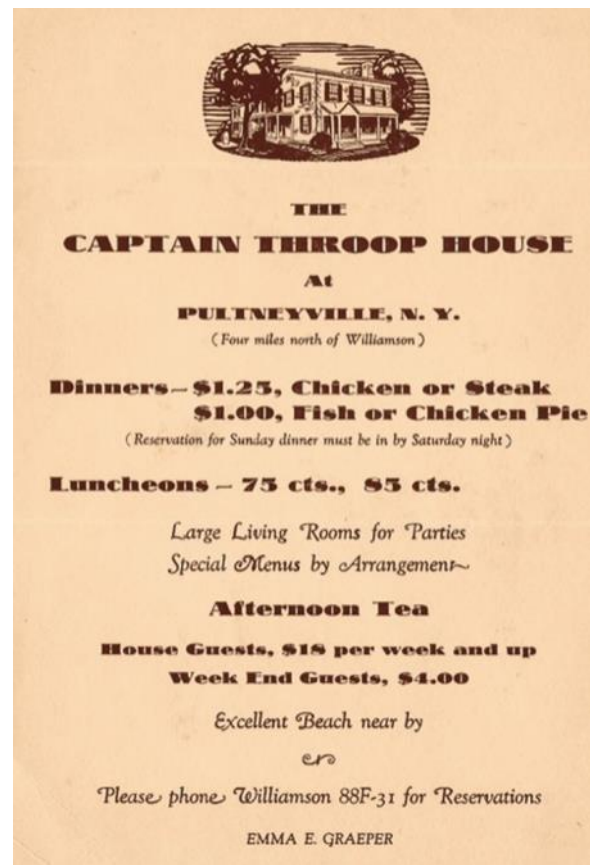
Carolyn was a Doctor of Optometry; she had an office in downtown Rochester which I visited many times. Later in life she opened an office in Williamson, just down the road from Pultneyville. Many of her patients were migrant workers that were prevalent in picking crops at that time. "Connie" as we called her, was very important to the migrant community residing in the Sodus and Pultneyville area supporting the agriculture business. It's hard to pick crops if you have vision issues.

Olga, the youngest of the sisters, graduated from Smith College with a degree in Social Work and was employed in the Rochester School system for many years. Oggie as we called her was very involved with troubled children, some from several prominent families. There were times when she would have a very hard time with the stress, she would always marshal through her migraine headaches. Oggie was a very warm, loving person.



Caroline Graeper, the mother of these four sisters died in her early 60s. This required Emma to leave a good teaching position in New Jersey to return to Rochester to see to it that the remaining three sisters were cared for, grew up and went to college. No wonder Emma desired to have her own little Tea Room.

My four Aunts had a residence in Rochester at 130 Commonwealth Rd, just across the street from our house at 159 Commonwealth Rd. Being surrounded by their love and kindness was a lifelong blessing. The Rupert family -- both my sister Carol and I, along with our children John, Jim, Beth, Meg and my daughter Brette benefitted from living close to them in Rochester, and spending great Pultneyville summers. I am sure that you get the picture.

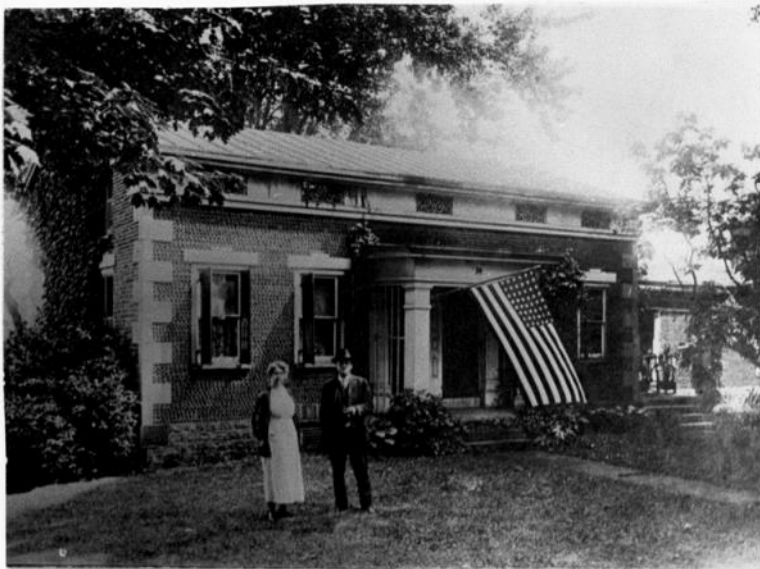

Dr. Josiah Bennett settled in Williamson in 1815 purchasing 400 acres of land on the north side of Ridge Road just east of the village, from this we get the name Bennett Street. Dr. Bennett married Ruth Reeves the daughter of the local miller.

until his death in 1928 and Mrs. Ward lived there until her death in 1936. After Mary Ward's death the property was sold and converted into the service station configuration we are familiar with. A photograph on the Wayne Historian's website circa 1940 shows the name of the service station as "Fox & ???."

In 1838 he had a cobblestone house built for his son Myron (a farmer) and his wife Mary Fish Bennett. This house is what recent Williamson generations know as the Cobblestone Gas Station. The farm must have been successful because the obituary of their only surviving child Mary shows that after attending the village school she then attended "Mrs. Nichols Private School" in Rochester and from there went on the "French School for Young Ladies" in New Orleans, LA.

In 1882 Mary Ward was wed to Dr. Westal W. Ward of Rochester who then set up a practice in Williamson in the cobblestone house. The earliest photo we have of the house is of Mary and Westal Ward in front of the house circa 1915. Dr. Ward built a wooden addition on the east side of the house which served as his office. He continued to live and practice from the house

Spring On the Grounds

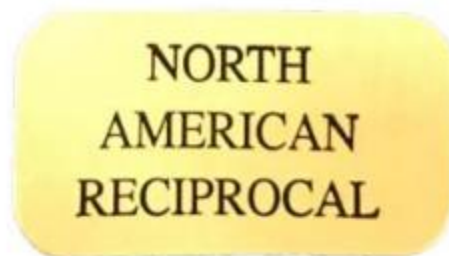

About the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society

Founded in 1964 and chartered in 1971, the mission of the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society is to preserve, protect and share local history of the Town of Williamson, NY, in general, and the unincorporated hamlet of Pultneyville in particular, by creating curiosity, inspiring involvement, and providing exceptional experiences by making history come alive.

The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the *Auchampaugh* home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years.



Rooms in the home contain exhibits, archived information, a gift shop and business office. The Society House is regularly open mid-June through mid-October 1-4pm Friday through Sunday or by Special Appointment by calling 315.589.9892.
