Thanks to Perry Howland's reproduction hand-operated cider press, and a mixture of apples from Chance Farms, LLC, around 50 youth and adults were able to learn how early pioneers and settlers in our area and elsewhere created this safe beverage; drinking water being a rare commodity back then.

Many thanks to Dottie Howland for serving up donuts to go with the fresh-squeezed cider, Blake, Lauren and Savannah Hance, Terry Sutherland and grandchildren Owen and Charley and Joe Kozan for helping wash and get the apples to those feeding the storage hopper on the press, and assisting whoever was cranking the handle to grind the apples into the pomace or squeezing the pomace to push out the apple juice to create cider.

Mother Nature provided a beautiful fall day for the occasion, helping to send everyone home with positive memories of this by-gone activity that was so essential to life back in the 17th and 18th centuries.




Scott Kime and Finger Lakes Stories



Holocaust Survivor, Samuel Rind, Shares His Remarkable Journey

November 8 2023, 7:00 p.m., Gates Hall

Author of "A Tribute to Mom: We Survived Together"

Join us to learn about the incredible life journey of Samuel Rind, a Jewish Holocaust survivor, as he shares his story of courage and resilience during one of history's darkest times.

Born in Krasnobród, Poland, Samuel faced unimaginable challenges when the Nazis invaded his homeland. The Rind family was torn apart as they sought to escape the clutches of the Nazi regime. Among those who embarked on this harrowing journey were Samuel, his mother, father, younger brother, aunt, and her three children. Tragically, only Samuel and his mother survived.

Despite the war's end, Samuel and his mother faced more challenges, being denied entry to the United States, where one of Samuel's uncles resided. Their journey then led them to Bolivia, where they sought refuge with another of Samuel's uncles. In 1960, Samuel was able to pursue higher education in the U.S., attending college in Buffalo. After completing his studies, he returned to Bolivia and began a career as an optician.

In 1967, a new chapter unfolded as Samuel married Gabriela, and the couple moved to Rochester, NY. They raised a son and daughter, and Samuel's mother joined them in the 1990s, living to the age of 93 and seeing her grandchildren grow into their twenties.

Don't miss this extraordinary chance to hear Samuel Rind's firsthand account of triumph over adversity. His story is a powerful reminder of the human spirit's strength and the importance of sharing such stories to inspire generations to come.

Pultneyville Recollections

In Part 3, the last of this series, Philip Rupert describes Captain Throop's involvement with the Underground Railroad and his design expertise.

Part Three: Throop and the Underground Railroad

Captain Throop was a man of vision along with big ideas. He designed and built one of the fastest sailing schooners that ever floated on the lake, and his steamer the "Ontario," a boat he designed was the finest passenger ship of her time.

Leaving the Pultneyville Post Office the Captain spoke to his neighbor Samuel Cuyler who ask him "have you heard of a new Law? If a slave runs away, it's our duty to return him to his master. Captain Throop answered, "If a man has enough grit to run away and reaches Pultneyville, I'll be danged if I'll send him back south." With that said by Samuel Cuyler, Captain Throop joined Underground Railroad ferrying passengers throughout the ports along with the cargo business that he was engaged in.

Those days there were bounty hunters in Pultneyville along with local residents that were interested making a quick buck. This article details a story just how the Captain negotiated this project. Earlier, I pointed out in the Throop house there was one room in the cellar of the house that was a mysterious place that we were informed to keep out. There is a high probability that room was once occupied by run away passengers designated to be included with cargo on the Captain's ship as it plied the waters of Lake Ontario. This is of course speculation on my part.

The Captain's engineering ability was especially notable. Considering he held no formal education but through apprentice learning he held many accomplishments. His personal comments are detailed in the extraordinary, above article. Considering the period in which the Captain lived, his accomplishments as a pioneer were historic. The tools used at that time with no power equipment to construct vessels of the Captain's high quality caliber is very hard to imagine. He was a special person.

He commented, "I have been very fortunate, there have been trials. I have always regretted my failure to secure investors for my screw driven steamer. I know my design was superior to the ERICCSON PROPELLER. But I have also worked with good people, and I was exceedingly fortunate to have had the opportunity to design and build my Ontario, the finest steamer on all the lake." Extraordinary!

If you take the time to think about the Propeller Invention which would have revolutionize the shipping Industry in its infancy. Captain Horatio Nelson Throop could have been a very rich man and influential individual in the growth of our country.

The Captain was born in 1807 and died in 1884 as a resident and builder of the Captain Throop homestead in Pultneyville New York.

It is truly my pleasure add to the unique history of Pultneyville, New York.






Fall on the Grounds

About the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society

Founded in 1964 and chartered in 1971, the mission of the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society is to preserve, protect and share local history of the Town of Williamson, NY, in general, and the unincorporated hamlet of Pultneyville in particular, by creating curiosity, inspiring involvement, and providing exceptional experiences by making history come alive.

The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the *Auchampaugh* home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years.



Rooms in the home contain exhibits, archived information, a gift shop and business office. The Society House is regularly open mid-June through mid-October 1-4pm Friday through Sunday or by Special Appointment by calling 315.589.9892.
