





### The Past – Old Pultneyville

From <u>The Bungle</u>, a family newsletter written and published beginning in 1937 by Ellen L. Todd. This piece appeared in the December 1, 1937 edition. Early Pultneyville resident Samuel Ledyard's granddaughter Grace, daughter of his son T. Scott, married George W. Todd in 1885 and the Todds and Ledyards owned several homes in Pultneyville. This piece probably is probably drawn from memories from these homes.

Winter in Pultneyville in the good old days was something to reckon with and long before the real cold came many preparations had to be made. First the kitchen had to be brought in the house for it summered in an outside room that could not be kept warm in winter, and the cook stove which was of enormous proportions, had to be, with much pulling and hauling and much persuasive language, induced to come in the dining room for the winter, and the stove-pipe, a long black antenna attached to it and strung along the ceiling to an opening through a second story bedroom and thence to the chimney.

This may sound easy but it was one of the difficult problems in housekeeping and the men in the family had a special vocabulary for just such occasions which always seemed to be necessary before the critter could be subdued and at last forced to stand quietly and solidly on its four feet with an oilcloth rug beneath it to protect the carpet, then another equally obstinate stove had to be installed in the "sitting room." This boasted the name of Crown Jewel but it was just as cussed in its behavior as the cook stove and had to be humored and cajoled and remonstrated with, and all the pushing and hauling and all the picturesque language had again to be used before the black monster stood resplendent in the middle of the floor towering above everything else and later, when red coals glowed inside it, looking for all the world like a lighthouse on a dark and stormy night for it had rows of isinglass windows through which the firelight could be seen.

But all this was only the beginning of fortifications against winter for all the windows toward the lake had to be sealed up and a storm house built around the front door. Then boards set out a few inches from the foundations of the house the space between packed full of leaves to keep the cold from the floors. Then the cellar was filled with food enough the withstand a state of siege for sometime, bushels and bushels of potatoes, bushels and bushels of apples, celery banked up in sand, squash, turnips, a barrel of cider, a swing shelf laden with preserves, enough of everything to last until spring and all must be kept very cold, but must not freeze and sometimes after days of zero weather the cold would get in, and pails of water would be set all around and lamps burned all night to keep these precious stores from freezing.

The Christmas trees looked quite different from those we have today. They were decorated with colored paper and popcorn festoons and the lights were real candles fastened on quite insecurely and since the snow beneath the tree was simulated by white cotton batting it must have been a great fire hazard, "but oh my foes and oh my friends, it gave a lovely light."



## "Bay of Naples" in Pultneyville

In late October I was privileged to visit Helen Andreoli, the great great great granddaughter of Samuel Ledyard, in Portland, Maine. Many of you have enjoyed the detailed model of the Ledyard/ Todd house which Helen donated to W-PHS in 2022. While I was in Portland Helen made an additional gift of several family portraits which will add depth to our story of the Todd family and its place in Pultneyville.

The most exciting part of our conversation was yet to come, however. I mentioned that there are several local newspaper articles describing the "Bay of Naples" wallpaper which once hung in the Ledyard/Todd house, but that we had no picture of it. I had learned that the same paper hung in an historic house museum in Portsmouth, New

# some came to pultneyville! "Bay Of Naples" Wallpaper

In the early 1800's an imported French wallpaper, known as the "Bay of Naples" design found its way to this country. So far as is known only five rooms in America could boast this scenic paper. One of these was removed from an old house near Albany and is now in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.

The Ledyard house in Pultneyville, built by Samuel Ledyard is one of these five houses. It has been owned by his descendants with exception of a few short years. Today, it is the possession of George Todd, a great-grandson.

On a soft grey background is a continuous panorama of wooded islets connected by bridges, Italian villas, waterfalls and views of Vesuvius in eruption. In the foreground are Italian figures in pastoral pursuits—fishing, driving cattle, feasting and dancing under the trees.

There is not a single repeat in the whole room. There are ships at sea, ships at quayside, scenes of boats being loaded and showing sailors in various parts of the rigging.

The paper is distinct and very carefully preserved except for a spot in one corner where it shows sailors at work. Here one of the figures has his face completely scratched off by some child of a by-gone generation.

About sixteen years ago, George Todd had decorators come from New York City and carefully remove the one hundred and forty-seven year old paper from the fireplace wall of the room, mount it on canvas and replace it on the wall. Since this paper was originally put on in blocks about 19 inches square, removing it took several days. When the job was finished, the edges of the squares had been so neticulously joined that they are discernable only to a very careful observer. There are so many details in this panoramic paper that one discovers something new each time he studies a given scene.

Hampshire and planned to visit that museum to see it. Helen had never heard of this scenic paper, but was interested.

After my brief visit Helen continued to sort her family papers. She discovered several snapshots of an unusual wallpaper in a room; pictures she might not have noted prior to our conversation. They clearly show the "Bay of Naples" or "Vues of Italy" in the Pultneyville home of the Ledyard family. This wallpaper, known in Pultneyville as "Bay of Naples," is a French Grisaille by Dufour officially titled the "Vues d"Italie" pattern. The unusual paper was hung in only a few houses in this country. It is a non-repeating panorama of Italian life depicting, farms, ships, castles and Mount Vesuvius and must have been quite dramatic. The paper was hung in the house at some point in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. It was removed between 1957 and 1979, but at last we have pictures to accompany the written descriptions.

Winter weather brings thoughts of basketball to Williamson High School students. Williamson has a long tradition with the game, many alumni have fond memories of evenings spent in the gym, whether playing on the court or cheering on the team.

According to Wikipedia, Dr. James Nesmith, a physical education instructor, invented the game in 1891 at the YMCA International Training School in Springfield, Massachusetts (now Springfield College).

The earliest basketball story in the Williamson Sentinel was in the December 21, 1916, edition which reported that "Elmer and Ernest VerDow, Floyd Benton, Leon Collier, and Lewis Aumann were in Newark Friday evening to attend the basketball game." The first mention of a local team was in the January 23, 1919, edition that reported the Kodak Park basketball team defeated the Williamson Tigers 33-20.




Winter on the Grounds

# About the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society

Founded in 1964 and chartered in 1971, the mission of the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society is to preserve, protect and share local history of the Town of Williamson, NY, in general, and the unincorporated hamlet of Pultneyville in particular, by creating curiosity, inspiring involvement, and providing exceptional experiences by making history come alive.

The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the *Auchampaugh* home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years.



Rooms in the home contain exhibits, archived information, a gift shop and business office. The Society House is regularly open mid-June through mid-October 1-4pm Friday through Sunday or by Special Appointment by calling 315.589.9892.
