### A look at the founders of the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society

Founded in 1964, the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society proudly celebrates 60 years strong in 2024. That in itself speaks volumes for the collective commitment of its five founders and the journey they embarked on well over a halfcentury ago to preserve and keep history alive in the quaint lakeside hamlet of historic Pultneyville, which dates to 1806.

With concerns that valuable lessons learned and stories of yesteryear would be lost or forgotten as generations pass, the group of concerned citizens began to discuss how they might form an organization to preserve Pultneyville's history, given its significant past. It had been the commercial center of the Town of Williamson for many years, with the best access to Lake Ontario, and also was a Port of Entry in the Genesee District.

Following many neighborly over-the-fence conversations, this small group believed that the time was right to start a historical society. They met several times at the home of Florence Forbes Cornwall to discuss the possibility. After several meetings a notice went out inviting "interested persons" in the community to a meeting. Shortly thereafter, on Feb. 15, 1964, the first meeting was called to organize a historical society — and the founders did just that with the support of 10% of the population. Though short the minutes of the first meeting may have been, they provided a firm foundation for a very long-lasting commitment to the preservation and sharing of local history. At that meeting, the Pultneyville Historical Society was founded. It evolved, later becoming the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society, as it is known today.

The W-PHS and community owe a debt of gratitude to the founders listed below who shared a common interest and devoted their time and attention to the task of starting a historical society.

Florence Forbes Cornwall had a deep love of local history, recognizing the significance of the area's heritage. Moving to Pultneyville from Rochester, she began documenting its history in the late 1930s. She wrote a book concerning the history of Pultneyville's beloved Gates Hall, America's oldest continuously active small community theater. Her other finished pieces included the Pultneyville Fire Company, the Cornwall family and the family farm along Lake Road, and the Hamlet of Pultneyville. A longtime resident, she enjoyed working on civic and charitable community projects. She loved the children of Pultneyville and is remembered for helping them master reading in her home while treating them to her famous ginger spice cookies. Cornwall was known, and is long remembered, as a mover and shaker and a real doer.

Alice Gallup was a fairly new arrival on the scene as a resident even though she had been summering in Pultneyville since the 1950s. An avid admirer of Cornwall and much like her, Gallup was interested in history, community-minded, had a great sense of humor and was talented. Given the historical significance of Pultneyville, it was hard for her to understand why no records had been collected, kept, or preserved for the first half of the 1900s. While the locals had many stories to share, few were documented. There was no official repository for records about Pultneyville's people or what they had done. Perhaps this is what inspired her involvement as a founder. Gallup served as president of the society for three terms, and also as treasurer and newsletter editor.

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Edward B. Leahy Jr. was also a fairly new arrival at the time who quickly became engaged in community affairs and was mesmerized by the stories from the good old days as told by the locals. He recalled that from the very beginning the founders' intent was to collect stories from the living old-timers before any information was lost, and to also collect any artifacts and ensure they were preserved. He loved to recall the Society's humble beginnings when meetings were a lot of fun — with joking and all the stories shared in the top of the old firehouse, where a fly swatter was used as a gavel — to having a permanent home at 4130 Mill St. Leahy often shared that in its infancy Society meetings were not boring or stuffy and that the organization was often referred as the "Hysterical Society." Leahy was the first president of the newly formed society in 1964 and an active member for the remainder of his life.

Chester A. Peters was a lifelong resident of Williamson who developed a love of history and had many community connections at a very young age. He knew many of the local residents born in the 1840s and 1850s and became fascinated by what he referred to as "Local Lore," often taking the time to corroborate facts he had been told in local newspaper accounts. He had a gift for retaining what he heard and enjoyed talking history with others. Peters mentored many, always nurturing a love of history. Seeing the advantage of photography, he purchased his first Kodak camera in 1928 at age 9 for 89 cents and in 1940 bought his second Kodak camera to take slides of people and places in the community — which he often used in presentations. Appointed the first Town of Williamson historian in 1965, Peters served in that capacity for 50 years and well into his 90s. Remaining loyal to the Society throughout his life, Peters was president four times and also served in other offices. His lifelong interest in history was invaluable to the Society and the community.

John C. Westerberg was a bit more familiar with Pultneyville than several of the founders who were new arrivals. He became a resident in 1958, acquiring a historic lakeside property in which he resided until his death. Originally from New England, it was no wonder that the hamlet of Pultneyville and its location appealed to him. With his New England background and love of history, Westerberg felt he was duplicating the life of early area settlers who were maritime men from New England. He immediately became interested in historic Gates Hall, delving into its storied past which began in 1825 when it was founded as the community's first sacred place of worship. Westerberg's interest was in preserving history for the enjoyment of today and the education of tomorrow. He was active in the Pultneyville Players, staging productions at the Hall for 12 years. Given his interest in history and his Gates Hall experience, it seemed reasonable to start a historical society and he was honored to be part of its founding.

It was for the preservation of history that this group formed a meaningful organization. It seemed appropriate and timely that a historical society was needed to collect and preserve history ... the recollections of the locals, life stories and artifacts of the area that the community was so willing to share.

With gratitude, W-PHS gratefully acknowledges the foresight and commitment of its founders who have all since passed. May their love of both history and community serve as the inspiration to work more collaboratively than ever in these changing times to ensure history is preserved for the benefit of future generations. Their respect for the past and appreciation for the importance of history continues to inspire others and encourages a sense of shared responsibility.

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### Dr. Arthur William Fisher

Here then is token and a sign That much is hidden, left in doubt In the great plan of the Divine, Yet man by searching much finds out. From <u>Niagara and Other Poems</u>, by Dr. Arthur W. Fisher

Yes, there is yet much hidden about realities in the life of physician and poet Dr. Arthur W. Fisher. A selection of facts remains in print, nothing of his personality.

Search we must! Born February 14, 1872 in Pultneyville, to Irving Henry and Assenath Fisher of England, we claim him as a native son. Siblings Adelaide, Rosetta, Nora, and Harry claim him as a brother. When he completed education in the cobblestone school in the village, he became a local graduate.

That was about all there was to being raised by this village, and Arthur wanted more than his hometown could furnish. He devoured studies from Sodus Academy, Marion Collegiate Institute, Cornell University, Medical School at Ann Arbor, Michigan, and took a break from input to try his hand at output when he became head of the faculty there.

We don't know what machinations ensued, but Dr. Arthur William Fisher re-set his direction to assume private practice as an allopathic doctor in Pultneyville in 1912. He responded to this turn of events by writing poetry!

As a single man, who lived betimes with his brother Harry and his wife on Jay Street, as well as in other situations on Washington and Main Streets, he spent time in travels to various and sundry places. Niagara Falls seemed to pique his interest in particular and was the location of much of his poetic reference.

On May 15, 2006, well past his earthly lifetime, Arthur was honored by The Corporation of the City of Niagara Falls in their new Coat of Arms, which included the motto "Tread the Smoother Ways of Peace", referring to the outstanding peaceful attitude of Canada and the United States as neighbors with a long common border - at least since the War of 1812. This motto was taken from the poem *Niagara*, published in 1924.

Not a bad life for a son of an 1800's cobbler on a lakefront corner, in a small yellow house in Pultneyville, New York.

From out the vast eternity we came To roll awhile, Then backward fall, worn, bruised and lame; The best of rank and file Are still but rolling pebbles else in name.

## About the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society

Founded in 1964 and chartered in 1971, the mission of the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society is to preserve, protect and share local history of the Town of Williamson, NY, in general, and the unincorporated hamlet of Pultneyville in particular, by creating curiosity, inspiring involvement, and providing exceptional experiences by making history come alive.

The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the *Auchampaugh* home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years.
