•On **May 30th** W-PHS hosted the annual 4th Grade Walking Tour of Pultneyville for students of the Williamson Central School District.



With gratitude, we thank Maria Ehresman, our Education Liaison, for organizing and arranging the tour which began at historic Gates Hall; tour guides Sue Jane Evans and Perry Howland; cookie bakers Dottie Howland and Joan Stell, and the Pultneyville Reformed Church for graciously hosting the group in the pavilion for lunch and games. Recent Thank You letters from our 4th graders confirm that it's a worthwhile event and continues to be important to creating a greater awareness for local history.

•On May 31st, it was our pleasure to welcome a group of visitors to Gates Hall while on a tour of historic sites along the southern shore of Lake Ontario who were in the area working on the development of an Underground Railroad Curriculum Project. The tour was designed to give a quick overview of the area landscape and present ideas for what might be possible for inclusion in the development of curriculum materials.

•On Sunday, **June 2nd** we were delighted to again host a by invitation only private concert for RPO Patrons at Gates Hall who enjoyed the sounds of violin and piano filling the air of our nearly 200 year old building.

•June 21st marked the opening of another Exhibit Season at the W-PHS House at 4130 Mill Street. Exhibits remain open every Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 1-4pm through Columbus Day weekend or by special appointment. Thank You to our many volunteers who make this possible. •June 27th marked another extraordinary evening of music with *Thomas DeFisher in Concert* at Gates Hall as he performed *A Timeless Love Story* featuring composers from the last three centuries. Needless to say, concert goers and performer were delighted to be in a more comfortable climate controlled environment this year than the over 100 degree temperatures at last year's concert!

Over the summer, keep an eye out for noticeable improvements to Gates Hall, supported by a very generous donor who immediately noticed the exterior condition of the hall when visiting for the first time. Recognizing the significance of our ongoing investment to preserve the hall, it was felt that it would be fiscally prudent to further protect the building from the outside in. Needless to say, we are beyond grateful for this commitment to partner with W-PHS to further preserve the hall and enhance its presence in the community as we prepare to celebrate the 200th Birthday of this historic building.

Die schöne Müllerin To Grace Gates Hall Stage August 8, 7pm Submitted by Nanette P. Hance

Thomas DeFisher will take center stage to perform *Die schöne Müllerin* at Gates Hall on Thursday, August 8th. Built in 1825, the hall provides a historic ambiance and backdrop for the romantic story set in 1823 of a young miller wandering the countryside who befriends a stream which leads him to a mill where he falls in love with the miller's daughter.

Throughout a cycle of twenty songs composed by the Austrian composer, Franz Schubert, with poems from the German poet Wilhelm Müller, the beautiful maid of the mill eventually has a change of heart in favor of a hunter. In despair, the young miller wades into the brook that has been his companion and drowns himself.

The performance, which moves from cheerful optimism to tragedy, will showcase the talents of DeFisher as both pianist and soloist as he brings this story to life.

DeFisher is a graduate of the Williamson Central School District and a rising junior studying at the Wheaton College Conservatory of Music, Wheaton, IL.




The theme of the 2024 Pultneyville Homecoming is "Sail Into Summer" so I thought it is only appropriate to show some historical sailing photos.

Pultneyville was founded during the Age of Sails and was a sailing port throughout the 19th Century. This undated photo shows an unidentified sailing ship docked at the pier with a steamship tied up alongside. The name of the steamship is blurry but may be the CORNWALL.



Sailing maintained a presence in Pultneyville into the 20th century though now it was for recreation and sport instead of commerce. One of the locally famous sailboats was the SCUD which belonged to Clarence Burcroff (C.R. Burcroff's grandfather). The SCUD was known for it's speed winning many races on Lake Ontario, it's speed was also rumored to be significant during the period of prohibition when it would take overnight sails to Canada loaded with local fruit and return with provisions for the PIG'S EAR a local hangout.

When the Pultneyville Yacht Club was founded in the 1940s it had a significant Lightning Fleet. The Lightnings are a 19 foot racing sailboat designed by Sparkman and Stephens in 1938. There are still a few Lightnings in Pultneyville, and one built in Pultneyville by Raymond Walvoord is in the Finger Lakes Boating Museum Collection.

In the 1960s, the Pultneyville Mariners were known for their extensive Sunfish Fleet. I failed to find a photograph of the Sunfish lined up sideby-side on the beach, however W-PHS has a painting of Sunfish donated by Gordon and Jackie Walker.

Recollections of East Williamson, as written by Lila Collward Shoales Submitted by Perry Howland (continued from W-PHS Newsletter May/June 2024 issue)

On the same street (Main Street) was the Dutch Albert Gage sold and planted trees for the public. Reformed Church. At that time Rev. Koster was minister. Rev. Koster married us.

There were two garages-Bilger & VanLare. VanLare sold gas and repairs.

There was a cemetery just west of the village.

Near the railroad tracks located north of the village was a canning factory which was operated by Frank VanEenwyck, which I think he owned. Many housewives worked there during the canning season; they canned apples, cherries and berries. We took our sour cherries and Columbia purple berries there.

At that time Frank VanEenwyck had a huge beautiful brick home built west of the village on Many thanks to former Pultneyville resident Georgia Ridge Road. We walked past it on the way to school. It was the talk of the town as no one had such an elegant place-it's still an eye catcher.

On our farm we had a cooper shop which was used to make barrels, no longer used for that purpose. Dad used it in many ways such as making celery crates. I was able to help make crates. They were piled outside ready for the celery harvest. Underneath, at the back, was access to an area for farm implement storage. The cooper shop was between our house and Hartsen's. Arnold and his parents were good neighbors. Ike Hartsen was a cattle dealer and farmer.

My brothers and I benefitted from the cooper shop. At that time salesmen would stop and ask to put signs on the old building advertising their wares. Some I remember were Barnum & Bailey Circus, they gave us free tickets to the circus-what a thrill! I remember Baby Ruth, Spearmint Gum, Chicken Dinner, Milky Ways. There may have been more but these I remember-I do not recall any tobacco ads.


Bert lived a few houses west in a cobblestone house. Just west of Bert's were the Windmill Cabins, the buildings are still standing.

Stella White was an elderly lady who lived alone across the street. I loved going there following her around as she did her chores, as she made delicious cookies.

The local farm crops were apples, cherries, berries, plums, celery, carrots, beans-a typical farm community.

I think of East Williamson as a friendly homey village, as everyone knew most everyone.
