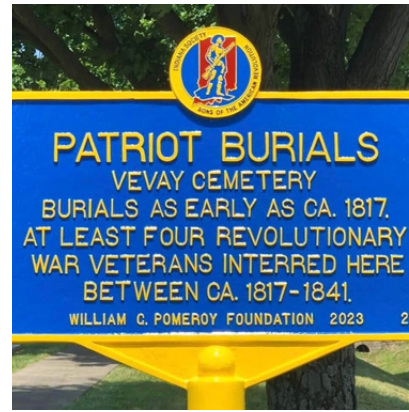

Semiquincentennial --not a word we commonly use but one that we will possibly begin to hear as the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution rolls out next year in 2025. Locally, we here in Williamson at the time of the American Revolution were mostly a wilderness inhabited by immense forests, many species of wild animals and occasionally by Native Americans hunting, fishing and trading along the lakeshore. Following the completion of the treaty formally ending the Revolution in 1783, some patriot soldiers moved to our area, settling down, raising families and helping establish what became the Town of Williamson in 1802.

According to Walworth resident Peter Fadden, there are 11 Revolutionary War veterans buried in Williamson. Josiah Dunning, Isaac Curtiss and Moses Blakely are three of those veterans and they are “proven Patriots,” a term used by Helen Camp, Daughters of the American Revolution representative.

Williamson Town Historian Perry Howland would like to bring attention to these three patriot soldiers by installing a Patriot Burial Marker at the entrance to their resting place in Pleasant View Cemetery in Williamson. Howland is currently applying to the William G. Pomeroy Foundation, based in Syracuse, to secure this lasting tribute. Assisting him is Tim Middlebrook, Sons of the American Revolution representative, who is fulfilling the requirements for the Patriot Burials Marker Grant Program stipulated by the Pomeroy Foundation.

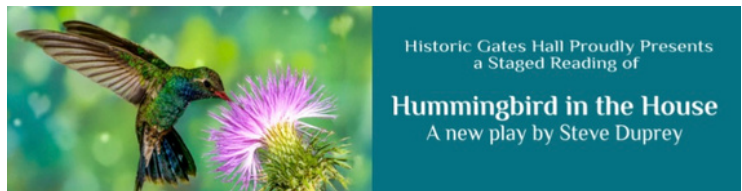

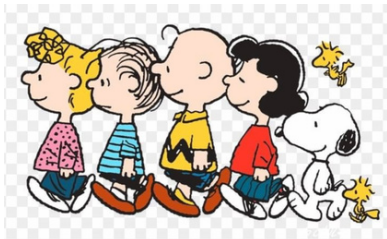

“Some I Remember” from Footprints by L B. Skeffington

I knew and worked with county agricultural agents by the dozens. They are the foot soldiers of agricultural extension work. In the early days the county agent was the important link between the farmer and newer things science and education had to offer him. The lone agent in a county had to be everything to every man, and somehow he made it. With the advent of the New Deal and scores of programs the agents were almost engulfed in paper work, their work load greatly increased, and they were fettered by a vast bureaucracy at the top. That they survived all of this is a tribute to their dedication and ability. Many former agents now staff industries and organizations which rank high in the business world. I can think of some in my own neighborhood: Phil Higley, president of American Breeders; Mort Adams, president of Curtice-Burns and the National Cannery Association; Mark Buckman, who turned the run-down Sodus Fruit Farm into successful big business;

Fred Corey, executive vice president of the National Apple Institute; Win Klotzbach, big shot in the Michigan cherry industry; Earl Merrill, who went to Republic Steel; Joe King, administrator of the Genesee Valley Regional Market, and many others.

“Skeff,” as he was widely known, wrote for the Democrat and Chronicle until his retirement in 1959. He filled posts as state editor, farm editor and associate editor, and was occasionally referred to as the dean of newspaper farm editors. Some of his pieces were compiled in three volumes, “a rambling and probably biased backward glance at some places I have been, people I have met and some items I have written,” he recalled. He and his wife purchased an old apple orchard in Williamson on the shore of Lake Ontario in 1934, named it “Rocky Shore,” and made their home there.

Recently Roland "Chip" Stevens III donated two small 19th-century family-photo albums to W-PHS. While small, these albums are a treasure trove of historical photographs of Pultneyville residents in the mid-19th century. The thing that makes these albums so valuable is that someone took the time to label the photographs so we now have identifiable photographs of many early residents. The albums appear to have belonged to the Waters Family, and so I will include some photographs of that family.

William Waters a native of Yorkshire England settled in Pultneyville in 1806 purchasing ninety acres of land on the north side of West Lake Rd where it is reported that he built a log cabin in Pultneyville (2021.0069.01). That tract now includes the Cornwall Preserve Pultneyville Masonic Lodge, and Pultneyville Fire Company. William and his wife Mary Simpson Waters had three children; Catherine, Zimri, William, and Elizabeth.

Zimri married Alice Brewer the sister of Aaron Brewer, the local blacksmith. As the oldest son he inherited the farm and built a cobblestone home in 1851 (now the Cheryl and Bill Kline residence) where they raised four children William (Will), George, Ella, and Maria.

Will, the oldest son, went west to Nebraska in search of fortune, but instead found tragedy when his wife died. He returned to Pultneyville with an infant daughter where he remarried and then went back west. Mother Alice Brewer also suffered tragedy when in July of 1870 her husband and two daughters died. Younger son George was a farmer and harbor master who with his wife Helen May Cornwall had only one child, a daughter Alice Evaline. Alice never married and when she died in 1952 the Waters property passed to her cousin Frederick Cornwall.

About the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society

Founded in 1964 and chartered in 1971, the mission of the Williamson-Pultneyville Historical Society is to preserve, protect and share local history of the Town of Williamson, NY, in general, and the unincorporated hamlet of Pultneyville in particular, by creating curiosity, inspiring involvement, and providing exceptional experiences by making history come alive.



The Society is located in a landmark dwelling known as the *Auchampaugh* home at 4130 Mill St. This house was built for Harvey Auchampaugh about 1858 by Russell Cole, a local blacksmith and builder. Auchampaugh was a prominent businessman in the hamlet, a harness maker, drugstore proprietor and Postmaster for several years. Rooms in the home contain exhibits, archived information, a gift shop and business office. The Society House is regularly open mid-June through mid-October 1-4pm Friday through Sunday or by Special Appointment by calling 315.589.9892.
